## Lessons from Steve

The Preacher of Ecclesiastes gives us wonderful lessons about what he saw under the sun. One such lesson is found in Ecclesiastes 4:13-16. The Preacher talks about how a poor and wise youth is better than and old, foolish king who would not heed the advise of others. Eventually this youth rose up from poverty to become king. However, here is where the story makes an interesting turn. All the people were with the youth who became king, but those subjects who came later did not have the same feelings. So, what is the lesson to be learned?

Reread Ecc. 4:13-16 and think about the story in terms of popularity. Many things are fleeting in this life and the pursuit of popularity is one of them. Countless stories could be told of those who achieved great notoriety, only to lose it and no on pays attention or takes them seriously again. Some will go to great lengths to attain a popular status, but the Preacher states this too is vanity and grasping for wind.

So, as Koheleth instructs, "Let us hear the conclusion of the whole matter: Fear God and keep His commandments, For this is man's all. For God will bring every work into judgment, Including every secret thing, Whether good or evil" (Ecc. 12:13-14.)

# Just An "Amateur"?

This was the concept shared by Jerry Jenkins at the most recent *Polishing The Pulpit*, held in Jacksonville, Alabama, this year. Brother Jenkins is the highly effective, long-serving preacher for the peerlessly evangelistic Roebuck Parkway church of Christ in Birmingham, Alabama. His was an audience of almost exclusively preachers. His point was basic, but profound.

He introduced his idea by going back to his rural upbringing, when he and several other boys congregated on a cow pasture to play football. There were no pads, no officials, no goalposts, no salaries, and (ahem) built-in impediments. What compelled these guys to join in the game? They were amateurs. Brother Jenkins then revealed the etymology (origin) of the word "amateur." I checked behind him by going to the office's trusty Webster's Dictionary. I should have detected it. The word is derived from the famous French word "amare" (the Italians say "amore"), meaning "love." As he said, amateur literally means "one who does something for pleasure, not for money."

Then, brother Jenkins called all of us preachers "amateurs." All you non-preaching readers have now properly "amened" his assessment of us. However, here is what *he* meant by it. A good, effective preacher is an evangelist, not a mere office manager. He does what he does out of the love for souls, not the paycheck he draws. While preaching has its "business side" and a preacher, like others, must provide for his own household (cf. 1 Tim. 5:8), have there been preachers whose primary concern was the pay rather than the people, the support over the souls? To quote a phrase used frequently by Paul, "May it never be" (the KJV more strongly puts it, "God forbid!").

Whether preacher or non-preacher, we share the gospel, we live the Christian life, we serve and are involved, we live Christ before others, we refrain from worldliness, and we overcome adversity best by being pure amateurs! Whatever you attempt in life, you will do far better and enjoy far more those things you do just for the love or pleasure of it than those things you push yourself to do because you just have to do it. Certainly, as parents, spouses, employees, and Christians, we must do the attending duties whether or not we feel like it. Yet, I am convinced that very often, if we will let ourselves, we can do all of these things "for pleasure."

Serve Christ with all your heart today, and do it just for the love of it!
