

Who were brothers Taylor, Howland, Smith and Johnson?

There is a monument in front of the Old Philadelphia Meeting house with a list of names of "Ministers Known To Have Served Old Philadelphia 1805 - 1940." "Served" on this monument means someone knew them to have preached there on at least one occasion. There are thirty-two names on the list. Some were well known, like David Lipscomb, Tolbert Fanning, and Jesse Sewell. Marshall Keeble is on the list, but his first name is abbreviated "Mrshl." Some are not as well known today, but there is history to be found on Wm. D. Carnes, Issac Jones, and E. A. Elam. I am still looking for information on Thomas Busby, John Lemmon, John Powell, Elonso Jones, H. Ramsey, and I. Donohue. The names that intrigue me at the lower right-hand corner are Bro. Taylor, Bro. Howland, Bro Smith, and Bro. Johnson.

The names of these four ministers appear is some old notes about Old Philadelphia, but the details of their lives are scant. I have learned that they were ministers from the black community that began meeting here is the mid 1890's, and continued as a congregation until about 1840. Brother Smith was the first black minister for those brethren. He was distinguished by a long white beard, and he had a favorite tree to which he would tie his horse. Brother Johnson would come to Vervilla to preach from Nashville where he lived. So far, all I know of brothers Taylor and Howland are their last names.

I am reminded of the Old Testament prophets. We know very little about them. No one can tell us the life stories of Joel, Habakkuk, or Haggai. I think of the apostles. We know most about Paul, some about Peter and John, but almost nothing about Lebbaeus Thaddaeus or Simon the Canaanite. Think of the companions and fellow workers with Paul, men like Epaenetus, Herodion, Rufus, and many others, some of who we do not even know by name. I pay attention to these names that are given, because they are my spiritual brethren, and I expect to meet them in heaven. In eternity, I would like to say to Philologus, "Yes! I remember! I read your name in the book of Romans!"

On many old stones in many old cemeteries I see the words, "Gone but not forgotten," but from

the looks of those neglected stones I suspect that many are forgotten. For many, no one alive to remember them anymore. I do not expect to be remembered for long myself. Someday a group may try to compile a list of "Ministers who served Rockliff" and someone may say, "I used to hear about a brother Boyd." If that is all, then that will be fine. If I am not remembered, I will be in good company with the forgotten prophets, apostles, and companions of Paul.

When I look at the names on that Old Philadelphia monument, I think to myself, "I do not know who they all were, but God knows them everyone." God also knows the name of every soul in every unmarked grave in the near-by cemetery.

To comfort the captives in Babylon, God had Isaiah write, "Lift up your eyes on high, and behold who hath created these things, that bringeth out their host by number: he calleth them all by names by the greatness of his might, for that he is strong in power; not one faileth" (Isaiah 40:26). The point is, God knows the names of the innumerable stars, and he has not forgotten us. I take comfort that Hebrews 8:12 says, "...their sins and their iniquities will I remember no more," but Hebrews 6:10 says, "God is not unrighteous to forget your work and labour of love, which ye have shewed toward his name, in that ye have ministered to the saints, and do minister." God forgets our wrongs but remembers us for good! Nehemiah said "Remember me, O my God, concerning this, and wipe not out my good deeds that I have done for the house of my God, and for the offices thereof" (Nehemiah 13:14). He close his book saying, "Remember me, O my God, for good" (Nehemiah 13:31).

One reason we do not know much about these prophets and apostles is because they were not preaching themselves; they were preaching Christ. That we remember Christ is their glory. That is why the names of Taylor, Howland, Smith, and Johnson are on that monument at the Old Philadelphia Meetinghouse; someone remembered that they preached Christ. If someone remembers Christ because of us, then that will be our glory also.
